A little thought.....

Jesus is the true shepherd of his flock, foretold by Jeremiah, who is moved to pity for his people. He will gather all peoples to himself and bring reconciliation to a divided world. He is not like the false shepherds of Israel who scatter the people of God. By the shedding of his blood, he has shown himself to be the true king exhibiting love, honesty and integrity.

Those people who have come to my room over the years will have seen hanging from the lamp on my desk a sign which reads 'BLESS THIS MESS'. (I sometimes say God has heard my prayer and blesses it - and it has increased and multiplied!) I wonder whether your life is very ordered or a 'mess'. It is worth thinking about, because it is often true that because we are so arranged, essential things get pushed aside - we don't have time. It may be time for God and prayer (very common, I'm afraid).

It may be for spending enough time with husband, wife, children, friends; for fixing something in the flat or room; for visiting someone in hospital, for sitting back and sorting yourself out, for writing that letter.

On the other hand, some people are so tidy, they shut out the possibility of breaking routine and so become rigid and inflexible, building a wall round their treasured routine - nothing must be changed. This means any change in personal life, society or the Church is rejected. But change aids growth. Our lives without being just a mess need a mixture of stability and change. New ideas and new ways of thinking and living and loving develop us. If we keep them and ourselves open before God in prayer, we can recognise God in the daily happenings which mould and change our lives. So do not be afraid! We are in God's hands and even the most unexpected and unpleasant happenings have a part to play. These are, too, the wonderful changes. As I often say to others - make time to love yourself a bit.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING *Jeremiah 23: 1-6*

A reading from the prophet Jeremiah.

'Doom for the shepherds who allow the flock of my pasture to be destroyed and scattered - it is the Lord who speaks! This, therefore, is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says about the shepherds in charge of my people: You have let my flock be scattered and go wandering and have not taken care of them. Right, I will take care of you for your misdeeds - it is the Lord who speaks! But the remnant of my flock I myself will gather from all the countries where I have dispersed them, and will bring them back to their pastures; they shall be fruitful and increase in numbers. I will raise up shepherds to look after them and pasture them; no fear, no terror for them any more; not one shall be lost - it is the Lord who speaks!

'See, the days are coming - it is the Lord - who speaks - when I will raise a virtuous Branch for David, who will reign as true king and be wise, practising honesty and integrity in the land. In his days Judah will be saved and Israel dwell in confidence. And this is the name he will be called: The Lord-our-integrity.

A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Ephesians

For he is the peace between us, and has made the two into one and broken down the barrier which used to keep them apart, actually destroying in his own person the hostility caused by the rules and decrees of the Law. This was to create one single New Man in himself out of the two of them and by restoring peace through the cross, to unite them both in a single Body and reconcile them with God. In his own person he killed the hostility. Later he came to bring the good news of peace, peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near at hand. Through him, both of us have in the one Spirit our way to come to the Father.

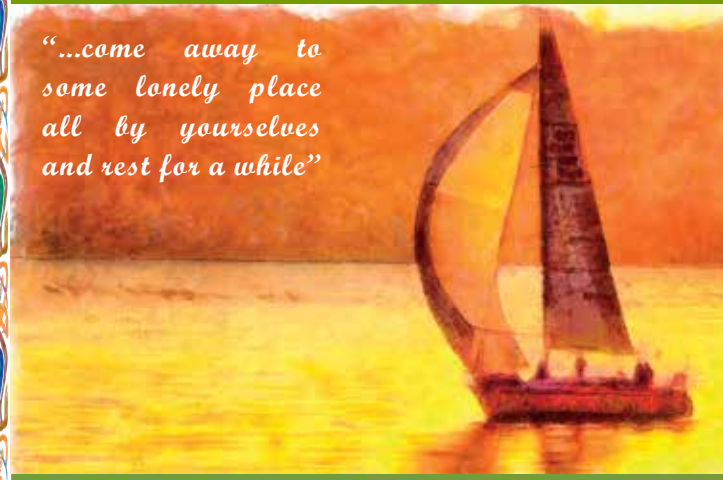

AFTER THE CONSECRATION

**The mystery of faith.
We proclaim your Death, O Lord,
and profess your Resurrection

The heart of Jesus is the "heart of compassion".
He sees his people in need of his teaching and of his love, and so he gives us his word and his body and blood, food for mind, heart, soul and body.

Today's Gospel has a distinctively contemporary feel. The disciples could be celebrities trying to escape the paparazzi. We see the disciples carrying out their teaching work and apostolic mission independently of Jesus, who is the ultimate mentor: he notes their fatigue and, when they are unable to outrun their public, steps forward to take over the teaching role, affording the disciples their rest.

We can discern a Trinitarian dimension to this passage: Jesus takes on a Fatherly role in his care, the apostolic ministry begun will continue through the work of the Holy Spirit post-Resurrection, and Jesus is the Good Shepherd of the Gospel parables willing to lay down his life for his sheep and, in this case, shouldering the yoke of teaching and pastoral care. The passage also resonates with two very contemporary acronyms: FOMO (fear of missing out) and LOMO (love of missing out). Jesus punctuates his own ministry with significant periods of rest in order to prepare and reflect for important tasks. We are all called to develop LOMO appropriately in our lives, and to appreciate both the pastoral and professional need to take time for critical reflection, to be holistic in our approach to workload in all areas of our lives, to be mindful of burnout, and to share the burden of work with others when we can. This Gospel also reminds us that, in ministry, it is not our work, but God's, that we are doing: not our kingdom, but God's, that we are building.
