As I, who am sent by the living Father, myself draw life from the Father, so whoever eats me will draw life from me. This is the bread come down from heaven; not like the bread our ancestors ate: they are dead, but anyone who eats this bread will live for ever.'

LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

AFTER THE CONSECRATION

The mystery of faith. When we eat this Bread and drink this Cup. we proclaim your Death, O Lord, until you come again. In offering his body and blood as the food of our lives, Jesus offers us the gift of his friendship and an intimacy which he compares to "eating his body and drinking his blood".





"I tell you most solemnly, if you do not eat the flesh of the Son of Man, and drink his blood, you will not have life in you."

Many of Jesus' followers were dismayed and confused by the instruction inherent in these words so no longer followed

Jesus was informing them and us today that to partake in the Eucharist, the high point of our faith, would involve a commitment of body and soul which would be evident from our very lifestyles and our treatment of each other.

Jesus, our Saviour, who knew that he would soon be called upon to give up His flesh and His blood upon the cross for all of us and in turn invites us to align with his sacrifice by committing to Him and his way of life.

The images in this Gospel are powerful. There is no half-measure in the commitment - Jesus gives all and we accept all. We accept not just the gift of eternal life but the challenges our faith will bring - the requirement for tolerance, compassion, perseverance, strength in the face of suffering. It is not enough to simply say we are Christian. we must live in our best imitation of Christ. Now more than ever the world needs Christians to be fearless in the face of injustice, tireless in our acts of compassion and boundless in our love.
